



## **1. INTRODUCTION**

This report presents the findings of the Spring 2016 Labour Force Survey (LFS). This is the second Spring LFS Report since its re-institution in 2015. From 2007 to 2014, the LFS was conducted on a yearly basis, in October, due to budget reduction.

The LFS provides information on the characteristics of persons in the labour force. The concepts used in the survey are in accordance with the International Labour Organization (ILO) guidelines and therefore, the indicators produced from the Survey are comparable to those used internationally.

The remaining sections of this report present the methodology (Section 2), the main findings with emphasis on the profile of the labour force, and those that are out of the labour force (Section 3) and other findings on expenses and housing characteristics (Section 4).

## **2. METHODOLOGY**

Planning and execution of the Spring 2016 Labour Force survey (LFS) was done by the staff of the Economics and Statistics Office (ESO), a department in the Ministry of Finance and Economic Development of the Cayman Islands Government.

The ESO's Household Register, which is comprised of a listing of all household dwelling units countrywide, provided the sampling frame for the survey. An update to the register was conducted between February and March 2016 based on information obtained from the 2015 Household Budget Survey and the October 2015 LFS, which revised the register to 26,792 household dwelling units. A sample of 1,403 household addresses was randomly selected for the Spring survey, representing 5.2 percent of all household addresses. The total number of households during the survey period was eventually adjusted to 26,569 based on post-survey results, which showed that 149 selected household addresses were confirmed to have no occupant households at the time of the survey.

### **Sample design**

The Cayman Islands was divided into six strata along the same geographical lines as the Districts of the Cayman Islands. Cayman Brac and Little Cayman were combined to form the stratum Sister Islands.

Probability proportionate to household population by district, as determined by the ESO Household Register, was used when allocating the number of selected households across strata. Households were randomly selected from all of the 6 districts; within each district, the

households were selected with equal probability, and the final sample represented approximately 5.2 percent of households within respective districts. The probability of selection for the sampled households in each district can be expressed as follows:

$$P_h = m_h / M_h$$

Where:

$P_h$  = probability of selection for the sample households in the h-th stratum (district)

$M_h$  = total number of households in the sample frame for the h-th stratum

$m_h$  = the number of sample households selected in the h-th stratum

### Fieldwork

In the October 2014 LFS, the ESO introduced the use of tablets for electronic data collection on Grand Cayman. This was the first time LFS interviews were conducted without using paper questionnaires. The Sister Islands however continue to administer the paper questionnaire due to the lack of an on-site trained IT supervisor. Attached in the Appendix (page 121) is a copy of the questionnaire that was uploaded to the tablet.

The reference week for the Spring LFS was the week April 3 – 9, 2016. The data collection took place over a four-week period starting April 10, 2016 and ended on May 10, 2016.

Staff from the ESO conducted three evenings of training in preparation for the fieldwork phase of the survey. A total of 31 persons, all of whom have prior household survey experience (census and/or LFS), received training on how to conduct the LFS using tablets. Thirty persons were selected to conduct interviews in Grand Cayman. In the Sister Islands (Cayman Brac and Little Cayman), four persons were trained for one day on how to conduct the LFS using paper questionnaires. All four persons were selected to conduct interviews. The trained interviewers comprised staff members of the ESO and temporary survey enumerators.

### Weights

The 2016 mid-year population estimate was derived by adding the 2016 natural increase (births minus deaths) and immigration data (work permits and change of status) to the 2015 year end population estimate. Data were obtained from the Health Services Authority and the CI Immigration Department for the period January 1 – June 30 2016. The basic sampling weight, or expansion factor, was then calculated based on the estimated population and the sample population adjusted for non-responses at the household level.

### Data processing

The survey returns were processed internally by ESO staff members. Data capture was built into the ESO Mobile LFS Project (LFSPri) software on tablet, which was first implemented in October 2014. Coding of industries and occupation were also conducted internally using the International Standard Industrial Classification (ISIC) (Rev. 4) and the International Standard Classification of Occupations (ISCO) 2008, respectively. Edit checks were conducted using CPro (Census and Survey Processing System) and SPSS (Statistical Package for the Social Sciences). Data were verified with cross-referencing information stored on the tablets or with a phone call to the respondent. A data file was then created with information from all households who completed the LFS interview (fully and partially). Finally, indicators were generated from this file using SPSS.

### Standard errors for main estimates

Given the nature of the sample design used in the LFS, the estimates were computed with a 2.5 percent margin of error. The estimates published in this report's tables are rounded to the nearest whole number or person. The sum of the individual rounded numbers may not equal the total. In addition, the difference of one person for the same category in different tables is due to rounding.

The estimates presented in this report are all liable to sampling error. Their absolute sampling error increases with their magnitude, while the relative error decreases the greater the size of the estimate. Generally, the smaller the *Relative Standard Error* (or *Coefficient of Variation*) the more reliable is the estimate. Because of this, comparisons of the larger estimates may be used with confidence but small estimates must be treated with caution. Consequently, estimates of

25 or lower (but not zero) have been suppressed as indicated by '...' or regrouped as they are considered to be unreliable or not useful.

*Standard Errors, Confidence Intervals and Coefficients of Variation (C.V.)* of the estimates for key variables for the Spring 2016 LFS are shown in the Tables 2 and 3.

### 3. MAIN LABOUR FORCE FINDINGS

In Spring 2016, the population of the Cayman Islands was estimated at 61,259. There were 34,617 Caymanians, 4,773 Permanent Residents and 21,869 Non-Caymanians. The labour force was comprised of 41,825 persons, with 40,213 of them employed and 1,612 unemployed. The labour force participation rate was 83.7 percent while the unemployment rate was 3.9 percent. The unemployment rate and labour force participation rate varied by sex and status (Tables 4 and 5). Figure 1 illustrates the composition of the population and the labour force.



### 3.1 POPULATION ESTIMATES

In Spring 2016, the estimated population stood at 61,259. The majority of Cayman's population lives in Grand Cayman, particularly in George Town which accounted for 50.7 percent. West Bay had 21.1 percent of the population while Bodden Town had 20.7 percent. The Sister Islands' (Cayman Brac and Little Cayman) combined population accounted for 3.1 percent (Table 6).

The average household size was 2.3 persons per household. Bodden Town had the highest household size with 2.8 persons, followed by West Bay with 2.4 persons. The district that recorded the smallest household size was Sister Islands with 1.7 persons, followed by East End with 2.0 persons.

#### *Sex and Age*

The estimated population according to sex distribution in Spring 2016 comprised 49.6 percent males and 50.4 percent females (Table 7).

Children younger than 15 years old accounted for 18.5 percent of the population while the elderly (65 years or older) represented 5.9 percent (Appendix Table 1.4). These two groups together are referred to as the 'dependent population' and accounted for 24.4 percent.

The working age population which is the age group comprising persons who are 15 years and older accounted for 81.5 percent of the population. Persons in this age group are usually working or looking for work and are said to be in their 'productive years'. It is this group that

children and elderly depend on. Therefore, the distribution of the population by age indicates a dependency ratio of one to three, i.e., for every dependent person there are three persons in the working age population.

### *Status*

The proportion of Caymanians (56.5%) in the population is higher than both Non-Caymanians (35.7%) and Permanent Residents (7.8%). Although Caymanians had the highest population proportion, it decreased slightly from 57.0 percent in 2015 to 56.5 percent in 2016 even though there was an increase of 942 Caymanians (Table 7). Among Caymanians, 75.4 percent were in the working age population compared to 100 and 87.2 percent among Permanent Residents and Non-Caymanians respectively (Appendix Table 1.5). This is expected since the local economy has a high proportion of expatriates that supply labour in various sectors of the economy.

### 3.2 LABOUR FORCE

The labour force is comprised of persons in the working-age population who worked, as well as those who at the time of the survey, did not have a job, but were available and looking for work during the reference period. In Spring 2016, there were 41,825 persons who were in the labour force (Table 8).

#### *Sex and age*

In Spring 2016, males and females shared the same proportion (50.0%) in the labour force.

The age group 35 to 44 years accounted for 30.5 percent of the labour force in Spring 2016, followed by the 45 to 54 years (25.1%).

### *Status*

The labour force distribution by status in Spring 2016 indicated that 47.1 percent were Caymanians, 42.7 percent Non-Caymanians and 10.2 percent Permanent Residents with Rights to Work (WRW) (Table 8).

### *Labour Force Participation Rate*

The overall labour force participation rate (LFPR)<sup>1</sup> was 83.7 percent (Table 9). Non-Caymanians overall had the highest labour force participation rate (93.6%) when compared to Permanent Residents WRW (89.6%) and Caymanian (75.5%).

In the category of educational attainment, the labour force participation rate ranged from 44.7 percent among those with primary school and below education to 90.8 percent among those with post-secondary education. The participation rate of females was lower than males in all of the educational attainment categories except middle year school.

### 3.3 EMPLOYED

The employed consists of those persons in the labour force who worked for pay, profit or family gain for at least one hour during the reference week, which was the week April 3 - April 9, 2016. Persons who, for some reason or the other, did not work during the reference week, but had a job were also categorized as members of the employed labour force. Such persons were temporarily absent from work. In Spring 2016, the number of employed persons in the labour force was 40,213 (Table 10).

### *Sex and Age*

The number of males employed in the labour force was 20,002. This number is slightly lower than employed females, which numbered 20,211 (Table 10). Those in the 35 to 44 age group accounted for the biggest share of the employed (31.0%). Persons aged 15 to 24 years and the elderly (65+ years) represented 5.6 and 3.5 percent of the employed, respectively.

### *Status*

Employed Caymanians in Spring 2016 totalled 18,584 and accounted for 46.2 percent of the employed labour force. Employed Non-Caymanians and Permanent Residents WRW totalled 17,675 and 3,954, respectively. These two groups accounted for 53.8 percent of the employed labour force (Table 10).

### *Hours of Work*

The number of hours worked by the respondent was captured using two approaches. The first approach is the *Usual Hours* worked and the second, *Actual Hours* worked. Usual Hours worked is defined as the typical number of hours worked during a normal workweek by the respondent at his/her job(s). Actual hours worked is defined as the exact number of hours worked during the reference period of April 3 – April 9, 2016 by the respondent at his/her job(s). Usual and Actual Hours worked includes all hours spent on work activities and overtime hours, but excludes vacation leave, sick leave, public holidays and other forms of paid or unpaid leave.

The employed usually worked an average of 43.2 hours per week. Males on average, worked 2.8 hours longer per week than females while Non-Caymanians and Permanent Residents WRW worked 2.4 and 1.4 hours respectively longer than Caymanians (Appendix Tables 3.31 and 3.32). However, the employed actually worked an average of 42.4 hours during the reference week. Males on average worked 2.7 hours longer per week than females while Non-Caymanians and Permanent Residents WRW worked 2.9 and 1.0 hours longer than Caymanians (Appendix Tables 3.33 and 3.34).

### *Employment Status*

The employed worked mainly as paid employees (91.7%), while 7.8 percent had their own business as self-employed with or without employees. Among employed males, 10.7 percent were self-employed, while among females 5.0 percent were self-employed. Caymanians

(13.9%) were more likely than Permanent Residents WRW (8.6%) and Non-Caymanians (1.3%) to have their own business (Tables 11 and 12).


### Occupation

The top six occupations in Spring 2016, which comprised 87.0 percent of total employment, were service and sales workers (19.7%); professionals (16.5%); elementary occupations (15.1%); technicians and associate professionals (14.4%); craft and related trades workers (11.6%); and managers (9.7%) (Figure 2). Analysis by sex and status indicates varying patterns. The largest share of employed males by occupation worked as craft and related trades workers (21.9%); service and sales workers (14.8%); professionals (14.6%); and technicians and associate professionals (12.9%). The employed share pattern for females showed that females were employed as service and sales workers (24.6%); professionals (18.5%); elementary occupations (18.1%); and, technicians and associate professionals (15.8%), (Appendix Table 3.27).

The largest share of employed Caymanians worked as professionals (17.3%); technicians and associate professionals (17.0%); service and sales workers (15.3%); and managers (14.8%). Non-Caymanians were mainly employed as service and sales workers (25.6%); elementary


occupations (22.3%); professionals (16.4%); and craft and related trade workers (13.2%). Permanent Residents WRW were mainly employed as technicians and associate professionals (15.4%); craft and related trade workers (14.9%); elementary occupations (14.7%); and, service and sales workers (14.4%), (Appendix Table 3.28).

### *Industry*

The top seven industries accounted for 67.9 percent of the employed labour force, these were: accommodation and food services activities (12.2%); wholesale and retail trade (11.3%); construction (10.4%); financial services (10.0%); activities of households as employers (9.8%); professional, scientific, and technical activities (8.0%); and public administration and defence (6.2%) (Figure 3). Males were mainly engaged in construction (19.5%); wholesale and retail trade (12.7%); and accommodation and food services (12.1%) while females were mainly engaged in activities of households as employers (18.1%); accommodation and food services (12.2%); financial services (11.5%); and, wholesale and retail trade (9.9%), (Appendix Tables 3.29).

Caymanians were mostly employed in financial services (15.2%); wholesale and retail trade (14.4%); and, public administration activities (9.5%). The top industries employing non-Caymanians were: accommodation and food service activities (18.1%); activities of households as employers (18.0%); construction (13.0%); and wholesale and retail trade (7.8%). Permanent Residents WRW were mainly employed in the following industries: wholesale and retail trade (12.2%); administrative and support services (10.8%); financial and insurance activities (10.5%); and construction (9.9%); (Appendix Table 3.30).

### *Income*

From the number of respondents who answered the income question, approximately 52.5 percent of employed persons earned CI \$2,400 or more per month (Tables 13 and 14). The proportion was higher among employed males (56.0%) compared to employed females (48.8%) earning the same income range. Caymanians (62.7%) were more likely than Permanent Resident WRW (56.9%) and Non-Caymanians (40.7%) to have earned CI \$2,400.00 or more per month. In the highest income range, i.e. CI \$8,400.00 or more per month, there were more males (71.4%) than females (28.6%) and more Caymanians (57.0%) than Permanent Resident WRW (5.3%) and Non-Caymanians (37.7%).

### *Size of Business*

Employed persons were asked, 'How many persons are employed at ..... place of work?' This close ended question had five applicable responses, ranging from 1 - 5 to 50 or more. The results, which indicate the size of businesses where they work, revealed that most of the employed persons (12,170 or 30.3%) worked in businesses with 1 - 5 employees and 10,217 persons or 25.4 percent worked in businesses with 50 or more employees (Tables 15a and 15b).

Further analysis by industry shows that majority of employed persons who work in the activities of households as employers industry work with 1 - 5 employees (97.7%). Additionally, those who worked in administrative and support services (41.1%); construction (39.3%); and, wholesale and retail trade (27.0%) were also more likely to have worked in businesses with 1 - 5 employees.

In contrast, persons who worked in accommodation (51.4%); professional, scientific and technical activities (46.8%); financial and insurance activities (45.4%); and, public administration (44.0%) industries were more likely to work in companies employing 50 or more persons.

### 3.3.1 UNDEREMPLOYMENT

‘Underemployment’ is defined as ‘Involuntary part-time’ work, where workers who could (and would like to) be working for a full work-week can find only part-time work. The underemployed accounted for 1.9 percent of the employed in Spring 2016 (Table 16). Underemployment was 2.1 percent for males and 1.6 percent for females. Caymanians had a higher rate of underemployment (2.7%) than Permanent Residents WRW (2.6%) and Non-Caymanians (0.9%). Persons aged 65 and above have the highest underemployment rate (4.6%) and those who have only completed high school education (2.5%) (Table 16).

### 3.4 UNEMPLOYED

Based on the ILO guidelines, a person of working age is deemed to be unemployed if he/she is without a job, but is currently available for work and has been seeking employment within the reference period. In Spring 2016 there were 1,612 unemployed persons, and the unemployment rate was 3.9 percent (Table 17 and 18). The unemployed were mainly persons who were either 25 - 34 years and older (36.9%), males (57.0%), or Caymanians (68.9%).

*Sex, age and status*

The unemployment rate for persons between 15 and 24 years (9.9%) remained the highest when compared to other age groups of the unemployed. Males experienced a higher unemployment rate (4.4%) than Females (3.3%). The unemployment rate among Permanent Residents WRW was 7.5 percent, which was higher than both Caymanians (5.6%) and Non-Caymanians (1.0%) (Table 18).

*Educational attainment and other information*

Approximately two in every five (39.0%) unemployed persons had post-secondary or higher level education. Among unemployed Caymanians, 29.2 percent of them had post-secondary education or higher compared to 86.9 percent and 46.4 percent of unemployed Non-Caymanians and Permanent Residents WRW respectively, (Appendix Table 5.6 and 5.7).

The majority (81.1%) of the unemployed stated they worked before, and 46.0 percent have been without work for more than twelve (12) months, (Appendix Tables 5.14 and 5.16). Unemployed persons mainly worked previously as service and sales workers (23.5%); craft and related trade workers (17.2%); and elementary occupations (14.9%), (Appendix Table 5.18 and 5.19).

When asked about their main means of job search, which was a multiple response question, unemployed persons' most popular responses were to ask friends (64.1%); contact an employer (53.7%); and, send résumés (53.0%). Unemployed persons also registered with the National Workforce Development Agency (NWDA) (40.3%) and to a lesser extent checked websites (29.6%). Caymanians (81.3%) were more likely than Permanent Residents WRW (18.7%) to have registered with the NWDA (Appendix Table 5.12 and 5.13).

The top five preferred occupations that the unemployed were looking for were craft and related trade (17.3%); service and sales (16.9%); clerical support (16.8%); technicians and associate professionals (14.1%); and, elementary occupations (12.8%) (Appendix Table 5.8 and 5.9).

The top five preferred industries where the unemployed looked for work were construction (20.7%); wholesale and retail trade (19.8%); accommodation and food services (16.0%); public administration and defence (14.1%); and financial and insurance activities (10.1%) (Appendix Table 5.10 and 5.11).

Over half (54.2%) of the unemployed persons received training for a specific occupation (Appendix Tables 5.24). The majority of those who received training (51.6%) did so before 2012.

Caymanians (82.8%) were more likely than Permanent Residents WRW (5.2%) and Non-Caymanians (12.0%) to have completed training before 2012 (Appendix Tables 5.29 and 5.30).

Among the unemployed, 70.4 percent relied mainly on parents or spouse/partners for financial support. A further 16.6 percent depended on savings and investments, and 4.3 percent relied on their other relatives and friends (Appendix Tables 5.22 and 5.23).

### 3.5 PERSONS NOT IN THE LABOUR FORCE

Those who were of working age (15 years and older) and not working, not available to work and did not seek work during the reference week were classified as not being in the labour force. A total of 8,122 persons were not in the labour force, the majority of who were females (56.0%), between 15 – 24 years (37.9%) and 65 years and older (26.7%), (Appendix Table 6.1 and 6.2). Persons who had high school or lower level education (68.4%) and college/university education (17.7%) also made up majority of those not in the labour force (Appendix Table 6.6). Additionally, Caymanian females, who numbered 3,380, were more likely to be classified as not in the labour force (Table 19).

The main reasons given by those not in the labour force for not working were student/in training (39.3%), retired/elderly (32.4%) and home/family duties (12.7%), (Table 20). The main means of financial support for persons not in the labour force were parents (38.1%), spouse/partner (21.6%) and pensions (14.7%), (Appendix Table 6.19 and 6.20).

### 3.5.1 POTENTIAL LABOUR FORCE


Based on the ILO definition, the potential labour force consists of all persons of working age (15 years and older) who, during the reference week, were neither employed nor unemployed and were either classified as unavailable jobseekers or available potential jobseekers. *Unavailable jobseekers* are persons who carried out activities to 'seek employment', were not 'currently available' but would become available within a short subsequent period. *Available potential jobseekers* are persons who did not carry out activities to 'seek employment', but wanted employment and were 'currently available'.

Of the 8,122 persons who were not in the labour force, only 601 persons were either unavailable jobseekers (68) or available potential jobseekers (533). The potential labour force consisted mainly of females (59.7%), Caymanian (80.2%), 45 years and older (51.0%) and with high school level education (51.7%) (Table 21).

The main reasons given by available potential jobseekers for not looking for work were student/in training (28.3%), retired/elderly (27.6%) and home/family duties (20.4%) (see Figure 4).

## 4. OTHER FINDINGS

### 4.1 HOUSING CHARACTERISTICS

The majority of households (48.8%) rented their homes, while 47.9 percent owned their homes (Table 22).

Majority of the households had internet connectivity (74.2%), computer<sup>2</sup> (74.2%), cable/satellite television (62.6%), and air-condition (90.4%). About two in every three households (67.6%) had no land-line telephone, but almost all (97.8%) had at least one cell phone. Approximately, one in every four households (18.2%) had a household employee and 50.8 percent of households reported having housing insurance.

In Spring 2016, the mean monthly rent reported for accommodation furnished or unfurnished was CI\$906.31 and the mean rental value for owner occupied dwelling was CI\$2,065.93 (Appendix Table 8.7).
