# The Cayman Islands' Foreign Trade Statistics Report 2014 

MARCH 2015

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## 1. INTRODUCTION

The Foreign Trade Statistics Report is produced by the Balance of Payments Unit of the Economics and Statistics Office (ESO). The statistics on imports are primarily obtained from the computerized records of the Customs Department as maintained by the Computer Services Department as well as from data generated from the new Total Revenue Integrated Processing System (TRIPS). These records are based on documents on the importation and exportation of goods as completed by importers, exporters or their agents who are required to record the appropriate statistical tariff code using the Cayman Islands Customs Tariff Law (CICTL). The CICTL is based on the Harmonised System (Harmonised Commodity Description and Coding System) of the Customs Cooperation Council (CCC).

The task of the ESO is mainly to classify the Customs data using the Standard International Trade Classification (SITC) Revision 3, incorporate data from other relevant sources such as the Port Authority and the Petroleum Inspectorate, and present the data in aggregrate format. The process of classification by SITC is a time-intensive, laborious task as there have been a significant number of goods that are not classified or mis-classified. The objective of the classification process at ESO has been to minimize the number of such cases; over the years, the value of commodities that are not classified by SITC codes has diminished.

In addition to the classification by SITC codes, ESO also classifies all imported commodities by Broad Economic Category (BEC) based on international guidelines issued by the United Nations Statistical Division.

ESO compiles exports data mainly from external sources namely, the US Census Bureau, the Statistical Institute of Jamaica and the UK Trade Data Online website. Exports data taken from the Customs Department are used to complement these.

## 2. EXPLANATORY NOTES AND DEFINITIONS

### 2.1 Trade Classification Systems

The Cayman Islands' version of the Harmonized System of Classification is the primary classification standard used for the Cayman Islands' foreign trade. In addition, the Standard International Trade Classification (SITC) Rev 3, which is the classification of international trade issued by the United Nations Statistical Division (UNSD), is used for the compilation of both the imports and exports of goods. Finally, the classification of imports by Broad Economic Categories (BEC) is based on international standards recommended by the UN.

### 2.2 System of Trade

The "General Trade System" is the system of coverage used in the tabulation of merchandise in this report. Under this system, all goods entering the Cayman Islands are recorded as imports while all goods leaving the country are recorded as exports.

### 2.3 Coverage

This report covers merchandise trade only. Trade in services are not included.

Included in the import and export statistics in this publication are goods sent abroad for repair and returned and goods re-exported as incorrect or faulty since they cannot be easily identified at the time of import. Excluded are goods in transit or other trans-shipments not destined for the Cayman Islands market, bank notes and coins in circulation; and parcel post exports for which no records are kept. Goods brought into the country directly by residents but are not declared are also excluded by default for lack of documentation.

The values recorded for imports and exports over a particular period represent the documents brought to account by Customs during that period. They may also include some goods actually arriving towards the end of the previous period but are accounted for in the current period.

Exports statistics cover both re-exports and domestic exports. Re-exports, which comprise the larger part of exports, are goods of foreign origin which have not been materially transformed while in the Cayman Islands. Domestic exports include goods produced in the country, extracted from its natural resources or manufactured in the country. These include goods of foreign origin which have been assembled or transformed in the country.

### 2.4 Valuation

All values are shown in Cayman Islands dollars (CI\$). Imports are valued at cost, insurance and freight (c.i.f) which is the value up to the time of delivery at the port. It includes incidental charges but excludes customs or any other duty paid on arrival.

Exports are valued at free on board (f.o.b), that is the value at which goods were sold by the exporters, and it includes all local charges to the exporting vessel or aircrafts. Freight and insurance are not included.

### 2.5 Revisions

Revisions are inevitable, thus the trade data on prior years have been revised largely as a consequence of corrections on previous errors, omissions, and misclassifications as reflected in the updated entries of the Customs computer system.

### 2.7 Limitations

In the Cayman Islands, a number of importers do not provide codes, or provide improper codes. Over the years, this issue required the ESO to vigilantly verify codes and provide missing ones. ESO continues to review the imports data with the aim of improving the accuracy, reliability and proper classification of the data.

Given the volume of imports, full details of the quantity and value of all imports are not available. The new Cayman Islands Customs data collection system TRIPS and the new Customs Tariff 2012 which went into effect on March 1, 2013, have addressed some of the issues encountered with the previous system.

## 3. COMMENTARY ON TRADE 2014

### 3.1 Visible trade balance

In 2014, the visible trade deficit increased to CI\$791.4 million, compared to the CI\$749.1 million recorded in 2013. This resulted from total imports of CI\$813.3 million which overwhelmingly outweighed exports (CI $\$ 21.9$ million)as in prior years. Among the categories of traded goods, the top three contributors of the trade deficit were: (a) mineral fuels, lubricants and related materials (CI\$162.7 million); (b) food and live animals (CI $\$ 161.5$ million); (c) miscellaneous manufactured articles (CI $\$ 128.6$ million) (see Table 1.1).

Importation of goods rose by 5.0 percent, while the level of exports fell by 13.4 percent. The increase in imports was largely a reflection of the growth in the value of nonpetroleum products, while the fall in exports resulted from a reduction in unclassified commodities \& transactions (see Table 1.2 and Chart 1).

### 3.2 Imports

In 2014, the total value of all goods imported by the Cayman Islands rose by 5.0 percent to reach CI $\$ 813.3$ million, compared to CI $\$ 774.5$ million recorded in 2013 (see Tables 2.1 to 2.7). The increase is due to non-petroleum products which rose by 7.8 percent to CI $\$ 653.9$ million. On the other hand, the total value of mineral fuels, lubricants \& related materials imports fell by 4.8 percent, reaching CI $\$ 162.7$ million when compared to the CI $\$ 170.9$ million reached in 2013.

Despite the overall decrease in fuel imports, the mineral fuels category still accounted for 20.0 percent of all imports. This was followed by food and live animals ( $19.9 \%$ ), and miscellaneous manufactured articles (16.0\%) (see Chart 2). Together, these three categories comprised 55.9 percent of all imports.

Imports by category of goods
Chiefly influencing the performance of imports in 2014 was a 17.4 percent increase in the food and live animals category which went up from CI $\$ 137.9$ million in 2013 to CI $\$ 162.0$ million. This is traced mainly to increases in miscellaneous edible products (67.1\%) and sugars, sugar preparations and honey ( $20 \%$ ). However, there were declines in cereals and cereal preparations ( $-15.6 \%$ ), dairy products and eggs ( $-6.6 \%$ ) and vegetables and fruits (-4.5\%).

The value of imports of mineral fuels, lubricants and related materials and manufactured goods classified chiefly by materials, recorded declines of 4.8 percent and 0.1 percent respectively. The year 2014 saw an increase in the quantity of fuel imported but a reduction in the average price of fuel. The slight drop in manufactured goods classified chiefly by materials is traced to iron and steel products ( $-18.9 \%$ ) and non-metal mineral manufactures n.e.s (-16.3\%). However, textile yarn, fabrics and related materials and nonferrous metals categories recorded an increase of 32.6 and 16.1 percent respectively.

Imports of beverages and tobacco recorded an increase of 5.2 percent with beverages increasing by 3.8 percent to a value of CI $\$ 27.6$ million. Imports of tobacco products also increased by 16.4 percent to CI $\$ 4.0$ million.

The chemical and related products category saw an increase of 3.6 percent, largely on account of dyeing, tanning and colouring materials (35.5\%) and medicinal and pharmaceutical products (5.6\%), while plastics in primary form and chemical materials \& products n.e.s fell by 18.9 percent and 13.4 percent respectively.

The machinery and transport equipment category grew by 7.8 percent, largely fuelled by growth in road vehicles ( $28.9 \%$ ). In 2014 there were 2,871 vehicles that were imported when compared to 2013, a 25.5 percent increase. In addition, there were increases in general industrial machinery and equipment (7.7\%) and office machines (6.2\%). However, specialized machinery and other transport equipment fell by 38.5 percent and 25.8 percent respectively.

In 2014, miscellaneous manufactured articles grew by 7.3 percent while commodities and transactions not classified elsewhere saw an 0.8 percent increase. Growth in the former category was led by footwear (53.2\%), professional, scientific and controlling instruments (34.8\%) and furniture and parts thereof (25.8\%).

A sharp rise in non-monetary gold (897.2\%), accounted for the marginal rise in commodities and transactions not elsewhere classified ( $0.8 \%$ ). In contrast, postal packages and special transactions and commodities saw a decline of 3.7 percent 29.9 percent respectively.

## Imports by country of origin

As in prior years, the United States (US) continues to be the dominant trading partner of the Cayman Islands accounting for 92.0 percent of total imports with a value of CI\$746.6 million in 2014. Compared to CI $\$ 714.9$ million in 2013 , this represent a 4.4 percent increase. Majority of the imports from the US in 2014 is traced to fuel ( $21.8 \%$ ), food and live animals ( $21.0 \%$ ), miscellaneous manufactured articles ( $16.7 \%$ ) and machinery and transport equipment (14.0 \%).

Imports from other countries also increased, notably Korea (167.4\%) and Japan (39.3\%) which may be associated with the increase in road vehicle imports. On the other hand, imports from Jamaica, Canada and Germany fell by 23.6 percent, 21.9 percent and 11.1 percent respectively.

## Imports by broad economic category

Analysis of imports by broad economic classification (BEC) reveals sharp growth in passenger motor vehicles (33.4\%), followed by consumption goods (9.6\%), capital goods (5.7\%) and intermediate goods (2.4\%).

Demand for the above-mentioned goods in 2014 was likely to have been spurred in 2014 by the recovery of the economy arising from growth in the local population, and tourist visitors. In the case of road vehicles, the increase in total value is due to higher average prices as well as higher volume of imports.

### 3.3 Exports

In 2014, total exports, which comprise largely of re-exports, fell by 13.4 percent to CI $\$ 21.9$ million compared to the CI $\$ 25.3$ million in 2013 . Four of the nine export categories showed decreases with manufactured goods ( $-56.8 \%$ ) and commodities and transactions n.e.s ( $-31.4 \%$ ) recording the largest decreases. Crude materials (374.9\%), miscellaneous manufactured articles ( $126.1 \%$ ) and food and live animals (121.7\%), registered the largest increases. The significant increase in crude materials (374.9\%) can be attributed to scrap metals being shipped out to the US.

For the same period, commodities and transactions not elsewhere classified which are mostly the re-exports of personal effects and the return of imported goods continued to be the primary form of exports contributing 71.2 percent of the total, despite falling by 31.4 percent when compared to 2013.
