# OVERSEAS TRADE STATISTICS OF THE CAYMAN ISLANDS 2006

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#### **INTRODUCTION**

- 1. This set of overseas trade statistics is produced by the Trade Statistics subsection of the Economics and Statistics Office. As in other countries, the trade statistics in this Report are compiled from computerized records maintained by the Customs Department. The statistics are based on documents which are completed by importers, exporters or their agents, who are obliged to record the appropriate statistical code number against each commodity. National trade classifications are generally based upon the system recommended by the Customs Cooperation Council (CCC) and which directly links to the United Nations Standard International Trade Classification (SITC) used in all statistical publications.
- 2. The routine tasks of the statistical organization are then confined to checking the credibility of the data and classifying them into tables that can be useful for analysis. In the Cayman Islands, computerized Customs system is currently being used to generate the imports data. The Economic and Statistics Office then processes the computerized data, conducts credibility checks, and prepares statistical tables.
- 3. One of the key basis for preparing statistical tables is the proper coding of commodities. In the Cayman Islands where a number of importers do not provide codes, or are providing improper codes, this has been a problem. Over the years, this issue would entail the ESO staff concerned to check whether proper codes have been used in the documents; or if the codes were absent, to provide the codes. The volume of imports has grown to such an extent that it would take considerably longer than a year for the ESO staff concerned to fully check one year's documents. The last year to be fully coded was 1981 (published in 1985) and for the years from 1985 onwards only a sample of documents have been fully coded using a simplified commodity coding system (see below). Moreover, given the volume of imports, full details of the quantity and value of all imports will require an upgraded administrative system based at the Customs Department. At present, only a sample of commodities have both quantity and value of imports.

#### Simplified System of Import Statistics for 1985 Onwards

4. The key objective of the abovementioned system was the production of an estimate of total trade with as much detail that can be generated by the available limited resources. From 1985, the total value of imports was determined for each port from Customs cash books. All high value documents (over \$25,000 or so) and a sample of low value customs documents were coded and scaled up to the control total for each port. Furthermore, for large regular



importers (where the invoices attached to the warrants are extremely detailed), a series of standard percentages for commodities were established and used instead of fully coding each warrant.

- 5. Another simplification was to reduce the number of commodity headings in the Cayman Islands' classification from 400 descriptions to about 110. This was achieved by combining the lower value headings into wider groupings. Around 50 of the most important headings were retained. The present headings, like those which they replaced, are defined in terms of the Standard International Trade Classification, and from 1991 the headings were amended slightly to match the new "Revision 3". These SITC codes enable the figures for the Cayman Islands to be compared with those for other countries at the two digit Division level.
- 6. The advantages of the simplified system have been somewhat eroded since 1985 by the increasing number of documents, given that the number of staff who can verify the coding has been severely limited. Moreover, there was also a need to change the data processing system to make it more efficient. Hence, in 1989 and 1991, reductions in the processing burden, including halving the sample of low-value consignments, have been made. Sampling naturally reduces the precision of the estimates but this loss has been limited by the reduction in the number of commodity headings now being used.

# Conversion to the Harmonized System of Classification

7. In 1991, the Cayman Islands adopted a version of the Harmonized System of Classification which is the basis for reporting in this Overseas Trade Report. This system of classification gives more detail than in previous years but is still beset by issues mainly due to administrative weaknesses in using the appropriate codes for the various commodities. While there is no direct concordance for some items, an attempt has been made to compare current imports with imports from previous years where possible.

#### **Export Statistics**

8. From the beginning of 1986, documents for goods for export (or re-export; for repair for instance) have been required by the Customs Department. Prior to 1986, the value of exports from the Cayman Islands has been assumed at around \$1.0 million each year during 1982-1984, and a little higher for 1985. The statistics for 1986 and after were compiled from the export entries lodged with the Customs Department. However, many of these export entries have no stated value, and estimates still had to be made.



## Coverage

- 9. Included in import and export statistics in this publication are: goods sent abroad and returned for repair and goods re-exported as incorrect or faulty since they cannot be easily identified at the time of import.
- 10. Excluded are: goods in transit or other trans-shipments not destined for the Cayman market (e.g. lobster tails trans-shipped to Florida); and parcel post exports for which no records are kept.
- 11. The values recorded for import statistics are CIF (Cost, Insurance and Freight) they are based on the values declared by importers and accepted by Customs, including freight and insurance charges, but they do not include import duties or other local costs. Exports are valued FOB (Free on Board) that is, the cost of delivery to the docks excluding onward freight and insurance costs.
- 12. The values recorded for imports and exports over a particular period represent the documents brought to account by Customs during that period, and they will therefore include some goods actually arriving towards the end of the previous period.

# Abbreviations, rounding and symbols

13. In tables where figures have been rounded to the nearest final digit there may be an apparent slight discrepancy between the sum of the constituent items and the total as shown.

**CIF** - Cost, Insurance and Freight Value including insurance and freight charges

**FOB** - Free on Board Value excluding insurance and freight charges

SITC - Standard International Trade Classification (Revision 3 is used in this publication)

**HS** - Cayman Islands Simplified Harmonized System of Classification.

**RE-EXPORTS** - Goods imported and subsequently exported without undergoing any processing, repackaging or other value added activities.

#### **COMMENTARY ON 2006**

14. The total value of goods imported in 2006 amounted to CI\$906.1 million (US\$1.08 billion). This represents a decrease of CI\$89.2 million or 9.0 percent compared to 2005. The decrease is directly linked to the winding down of the country's post Ivan reconstruction. (See Chart 1 and Table 1 on page 10).




Chart 1: Annual Imports, (CIF in CI\$ Millions) 2000-2006

- 15. Exports in 2006 amounted to CI\$10.7 million which is 122.9 percent higher than the recorded level a year ago. The visible trade deficit was therefore CI\$895.4 million, an improvement from the deficit of CI\$990.5 million in 2005 (See Table 1 on page 10).
- 16. Imports in 2006 decreased in all quarters, except the third quarter, compared to the previous year.
- 17. Table 3B (see page 13) & Chart 2 show the merchandise imports in 2006 by broad economic category (consumer goods, intermediate goods, capital goods and fuel). This exercise was limited by the presence of unclassified imports which were subsequently classified by assuming that they could be proportionately distributed across the given major groupings. The results show that in 2006, capital imports



comprise 21.1 percent of imports; consumer goods, 47.7 percent; intermediate goods, 16.8 percent; and fuel, 14.4 percent.




Chart 2: Imports by Broad Economic Category, 2006

Table 4 (see pages 14-24) shows a detailed classification of imports based on the UN Standard International Classification. A summary of this classification is shown in Chart 3 and Table 4A (see page 25).

As in previous years, the most serious limitation of Tables 4 (see pages 14-24) & 4A (see page 25). is the level of imports that have not been properly classified. In 2006, these amounted to CI\$80.9 million or 8.9 percent of total imports.






Chart 3: Imports by SITC, 2006

- 18. Table 5 (see page 26) shows quantities and average CIF unit values for selected imports from 2000-2006. It shows, for instance, that the number of imported vehicles dropped from 8,407 in 2005 to 3,983 in 2006.
- 19. Import figures by major countries of origin are presented in Table 6 (see page 28). It shows the continued dominance of the USA as source of imports into the Cayman Islands as it accounted for 71.8 percent of total imports. The Netherlands Antilles was second overall with CI\$73.0 million or 8.0 percent. Japan ranked third with CI\$6.3 million or 0.7 percent of total imports. The United Kingdom and Jamaica tied for fourth, with CI\$4.5 million or 0.5 percent of total imports.
- 20. Table 7 (see page 30) shows the value of imports by port of entry. Majority (71.4%) of imports in 2006 continued to enter through George Town Docks.
- 21. Table 7 (see page 30) also shows the total amount of duty-free imports which reached \$84.2 million in 2006, or 9.3 percent of total imports.
