# The Cayman Islands' Foreign Trade Statistics Report 2009

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## 1. INTRODUCTION

The Foreign Trade Statistics Report is produced by the Balance of Payments Unit of the Economics and Statistics Office (ESO). The statistics are primarily obtained from the computerized records maintained by the Customs Department. These records are based on documents on the importation and exportation of goods as completed by importers, exporters or their agents who are required to record the appropriate statistical tariff code using the Cayman Islands Tariff Code (CITC). The CITC is based on the Harmonised System (Harmonised Commodity Description and Coding System) of the Customs Cooperation Council (CCC) and the Standard International Trade Classification (SITC) Revision 3.

The task of the ESO is mainly to incorporate and check the credibility of the data, and classify them into tables that can be useful for analysis. The process of classification is a timeintensive, laborious task as there have been a significant number of goods that are not classified or mis-classified. The objective of the classification process has been to minimize the number of such cases; over the years, the value of commodities that are not classified by SITC codes has diminished.

In addition to the classification by SITC codes, ESO also classifies all imported commodities by Broad Economic Category (BEC) based on international guidelines issued by the United Nations (UN).

## 2. EXPLANATORY NOTES AND DEFINITIONS

### 2.1 Trade Classification

The Cayman Islands version of the Harmonized System of Classification is the primary classification standard used for the Cayman Islands' foreign trade. In addition, the Standard International Trade Classification (SITC) Rev 3, which is the classification of international trade issued by the United Nations (UN), is used for the compilation of both the imports and exports of goods. Finally, the classification of imports by Broad Economic Categories (BEC) is based on international standards recommended by the UN.

### 2.2 System of Trade

The "General Trade System" is the system of coverage used in the tabulation of merchandise in this report. Under this system, all goods entering the Cayman Islands are recorded as imports while all goods leaving the country are recorded as exports.

### 2.3 Coverage

- This report covers merchandise trade only. Trade in services are not included.
- Included in the import and export statistics in this publication are goods sent abroad and returned for repair and goods re-exported as incorrect or faulty since they cannot be easily identified at the time of import. Excluded are goods in transit or other transshipments not destined for the Cayman market, monetary gold and bullion, bank notes and coins in circulation; and parcel post exports for which no records are kept. Goods brought into the country directly by residents but are not declared are also excluded by default for lack of documentation.
- The values recorded for imports and exports over a particular period represent the documents brought to account by Customs during that period. They also include some goods actually arriving towards the end of the previous period but are accounted for in the current period.
- Exports are a combination of both domestic and re-exports. Domestic exports include goods produced in the country, extracted from its natural resources or manufactured in the country. These include goods of foreign origin which have been assembled or transformed in the country. Re-exports are goods of foreign origin which have not been materially transformed while in the Cayman Islands.
- Exports data are obtained from the counterpart statistical agencies abroad namely, the US Census Bureau, the Jamaica Statistical Institute, and the UK Trade Data Online website. They include domestic exports and re-exports.


### 2.4 Valuation

- All values are shown in Cayman Islands dollars (CI\$). Imports are valued cost, insurance and freight(c.i.f) which is the value up to the time of delivery at the port. It includes incidental charges but excludes customs or any other duty paid on arrival.
- Exports are valued at free on board (f.o.b), that is the value at which goods were sold by the exporters, and it includes all local charges to the exporting vessel or aircrafts. Freight and insurance are not included.


### 2.5 Revision

- The imports data for the year 2008 has been revised, largely as a consequence of errors, omissions, misclassifications and the subsequent update of the entries in the Customs computer system.
- The export data which are obtained from the statistical offices of the US Census Bureau, the Jamaica Statistical Institute and the UK Trade Data Online website have been revised from the last publication. The export data series for the period 2005-2008 has been revised substantially. The data was adjusted largely to cover only the goods which are deemed to be exported from the Cayman Islands and not the country of consignment or registration of ships. The revision was undertaken after further investigation of the detailed data, which revealed that some of the data previously published included transhipments, and other exports which are not originally from the Cayman Islands.

### 2.7 Limitations

In the Cayman Islands, a number of importers do not provide codes, or are providing improper codes. Over the years, this issue required the ESO to vigilantly verify codes and provide missing ones. Given the volume of imports, full details of the quantity and value of all imports will require an upgrade of the current administrative system based at the Cayman Islands Customs Department. At present, only a small proportion of commodities have both quantity and value of imports. An exercise is currently in progress to review the import data with the aim of improving the accuracy, reliability and classification of the data.

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## 3. COMMENTARY ON TRADE 2009

### 3.1 Visible trade balance

In 2009, the visible trade balance recorded a deficit of CI $\$ 719.9$ million, compared to CI\$867.0 million recorded in 2008 (see Chart 1). The improvement in the 2009 deficit was largely influenced by the decline in imports along with an increase in exports. Imports fell by 16.3 percent to reach to $\$ 735.9$ million compared to $\$ 879.4$ million recorded in 2008, while exports increased by 28.4 percent to reach $\$ 16.0$ million compared to the $\$ 12.4$ million recorded in 2008 (see Table 1.1 on page 10).


### 3.2 Imports

The classification of imports by SITC Section in 2009, show that miscellaneous manufactured articles accounted for $\mathrm{CI} \$ 324.8$ million or 44.1 percent of total imports. This is followed by food and live animals with or CI $\$ 94.3$ million or 12.8 percent, and minerals fuels, lubricants and related materials with $\mathrm{CI} \$ 88.0$ million or 12 percent (see Chart 2 and Table 1.1).


Import figures by country of origin are presented in Table 2.2 (see page 13). It shows the continued dominance of the USA as the major source of goods imported into the Cayman Islands as it accounted for CI $\$ 556.8$ million or 75.7 percent of total imports. The Netherlands Antilles was second overall with CI\$84.6 million or 11.5 percent. Jamaica ranked third with CI\$6.3 million or 0.9 percent of total imports. The UK was fourth, with CI $\$ 3.9$ million or 0.4 percent of total imports.

Table 2.3 (see page 14) shows the value of imports by port of entry. The majority ( $66.1 \%$ ) of imports in 2009 continued to enter through the George Town Docks. Imports through Owen Roberts Airport decreased from CI $\$ 150.7$ million in 2008 to CI $\$ 148.9$ million in 2009.

Table 2.7 also shows the total amount of duty-free imports which reached CI $\$ 131.7$ million in 2009, or 17.9 percent of total imports. This level represents an increase compared to CI $\$ 127.7$ million or 14.5 percent of total imports in 2008.

Table 2.4 (see page 15) show imports by SITC Section for the five-year period, 2005 to 2009 and the percentage contribution to the total. Of the nine sections, miscellaneous manufactured articles (8), followed by food \& live animals (0), mineral fuels, lubricants and related materials (3), machinery \& transport equipment (7), and commodities \& transactions not classified elsewhere (9), continue to dominate imports.

In 2009, decreases were recorded in eight of the ten SITC sections but the greatest decrease in terms of dollar amount came in the mineral fuels, lubricants and related materials (3) with CI $\$ 54.6$ million or 38.3 percent less than 2008, Miscellaneous Manufactured Articles (8) decreased by CI $\$ 35.2$ or CI $\$ 9.8 \%$.

Like Tables 2.4 and 2.5, Table 2.6 (see pages 19 to 29) shows a detailed classification of imports on both the section and division levels. In 2009, some increases were recorded in live animals except fish, milk and cream, cheese and vegetables and fruits. Road vehicles and petroleum, particularly diesel and tobacco products are a few of the items which recorded significant decreases.

Under SITC code 900 (see Table 2.6 page 28); items 0001-0019 from the Customs' first schedule are listed and are exempt from custom duties for a variety of reasons. Also listed under SITC code 900 is 9999 , which is a generic code for duty-free items. Over the years, these figures have been reduced due to a reclassification of goods to their proper tariff heading.

Table 2.7 (see page 30) and Chart 3 show merchandise imports in 2009 by Broad Economic Category (BEC) which are consumer goods, intermediate goods, capital goods and fuel. There were limitations to the reclassification of trade data into the BEC category mainly due to the presence of a high percentage of unclassified imports. These unclassified imports were proportionately distributed across the given major groupings. The results show that in 2009, capital goods comprises 15.0 percent of imports; consumer goods, 52.6 percent; intermediate goods, 20.4 percent; and fuel, 12.0 percent.


Table 2.8 (see page 31) shows quantities and average CIF unit values for selected imports from 2000 to 2009. It shows, for instance, that the unit price of fuels decreased in 2009 to $\$ 1.87$ per imperial gallon compared to $\$ 3.20$ in 2008 .

### 3.3 Exports

Table 3.1 (see page 32) presents the revised exports data mainly due to new data sets obtained for exports to the USA, the UK and Jamaica. Total exports in 2009 amounted to CI\$16.0. Total exports in 2009 were 28.4 percent higher compared to 2008.

In 2009, commodities and transactions not elsewhere classified accounted for 53 percent (CI $\$ 8.4$ million) of total exports followed by miscellaneous manufactured articles with 18 percent (CI $\$ 3.0$ million) and food and live animals with 6.6 percent (CI $\$ 1.0$ million (see Chart 4 on page 9 and Table 1.1 on page 10).
