## 1. INTRODUCTION

The Foreign Trade Statistics Report is produced by the Balance of Payments Unit of the Economics and Statistics Office (ESO). The statistics are primarily obtained from the computerized records maintained by the Customs Department. These records are based on documents on the importation and exportation of goods as completed by importers, exporters or their agents who are required to record the appropriate statistical tariff code using the Cayman Islands Tariff Code (CITC). The CITC is based on the Harmonised System (Harmonised Commodity Description and Coding System) of the Customs Cooperation Council (CCC) and the Standard International Trade Classification (SITC) Revision 3.

The task of the ESO is mainly to incorporate and check the credibility of the data, and classify them into tables that can be useful for analysis. The process of classification is a timeintensive, laborious task as there have been a significant number of goods that are not classified or mis-classified. The objective of the classification process has been to minimize the number of such cases; over the years, the value of commodities that are not classified by SITC codes has diminished.

In addition to the classification by SITC codes, ESO also classifies all imported commodities by Broad Economic Category (BEC) based on international guidelines issued by the United Nations (UN).

## 2. EXPLANATORY NOTES AND DEFINITIONS

### 2.1 Trade Classification Systems

The Cayman Islands' version of the Harmonized System of Classification is the primary classification standard used for the Cayman Islands' foreign trade. In addition, the Standard International Trade Classification (SITC) Rev 3, which is the classification of international trade issued by the United Nations (UN), is used for the compilation of both the imports and exports of goods. Finally, the classification of imports by Broad Economic Categories (BEC) is based on international standards recommended by the UN.

### 2.2 System of Trade

The "General Trade System" is the system of coverage used in the tabulation of merchandise in this report. Under this system, all goods entering the Cayman Islands are recorded as imports while all goods leaving the country are recorded as exports.

### 2.3 Coverage

This report covers merchandise trade only. Trade in services are not included.
Included in the import and export statistics in this publication are goods sent abroad and returned for repair and goods re-exported as incorrect or faulty since they cannot be easily identified at the time of import. Excluded are goods in transit or other trans-shipments not destined for the Cayman Islands market, monetary gold and bullion, bank notes and coins in circulation; and parcel post exports for which no records are kept. Goods brought into the country directly by residents but are not declared are also excluded by default for lack of documentation.

The values recorded for imports and exports over a particular period represent the documents brought to account by Customs during that period. They may also include some goods actually arriving towards the end of the previous period but are accounted for in the current period.

Exports are a combination of both domestic and re-exports. Domestic exports include goods produced in the country, extracted from its natural resources or manufactured in the country. These include goods of foreign origin which have been assembled or transformed in the country. Re-exports are goods of foreign origin which have not been materially transformed while in the Cayman Islands.

Exports data are obtained from the counterpart statistical agencies abroad namely, the US Census Bureau, the Jamaica Statistical Institute, and the UK Trade Data Online website.

They include domestic exports and re-exports, however, the majority of the exports are re-exports.

### 2.4 Valuation

All values are shown in Cayman Islands dollars (CI\$). Imports are valued at cost, insurance and freight (c.i.f) which is the value up to the time of delivery at the port. It includes incidental charges but excludes customs or any other duty paid on arrival.

Exports are valued at free on board (f.o.b), that is the value at which goods were sold by the exporters, and it includes all local charges to the exporting vessel or aircrafts. Freight and insurance are not included.

### 2.5 Revisions

The imports data for the years 2006 to 2010 have been revised, largely as a consequence of corrections on previous errors, omissions, misclassifications as reflected in the updated entries of the Customs computer system. Particularly, petroleum products have been revised due to the understated quantity in the previous years. In this report, major revisions were made to the classification of imports by country of origin which affected the years 2006 to 2011. In previous trade reports, most of the oil imported was misclassified as originating from the Netherlands Antilles. Subsequent investigations revealed that the majority originated from the United States, and this is therefore reflected in this report

### 2.7 Limitations

In the Cayman Islands, a number of importers do not provide codes, or provide improper codes. Over the years, this issue required the ESO to vigilantly verify codes and provide missing ones. ESO continues to review the imports data with the aim of improving the accuracy, reliability and proper classification of the data.

Given the volume of imports, full details of the quantity and value of all imports are not available. This will require an upgrade of the current administrative system based at the Cayman Islands Customs Department. At present, only a small proportion of commodities have both quantity and value of imports.

## 3. COMMENTARY ON TRADE 2011

### 3.1 Visible trade balance

In 2011, the Cayman Islands experienced an increase of 9.5 percent in its trade deficit to reach CI $\$ 744.0$ million. This is in contrast to the CI $\$ 679.3$ million recorded in 2010 which was a 6.8 percent decline from 2009. The increase in the deficit was largely due to increased imports, offsetting an increase in exports. The trade deficit was primarily on account of mineral fuels, lubricants and related materials ( $24.6 \%$ ) followed by miscellaneous manufactured articles (17.9\%), food and live animals (15.9\%) and machinery and transport equipment ( $14.2 \%$ ).

### 3.2 Imports

Imports for 2011 grew by 10.4 percent, reversing the 7.3 percent decline recorded in 2010. Total goods imported amounted to CI $\$ 762.0$ million, as compared to the CI $\$ 690.4$ million in 2010. This largely reflects an increase in economic activities in 2011 (see Table 1.2).

The overall increase in imports is attributed to increases recorded in mineral fuels, lubricants and related materials ( $43.2 \%$ ), machinery and transport equipment ( $9.7 \%$ ), food and live animals $(4.7 \%)$ and chemicals and related products ( $0.5 \%$ ).

The 4.7 percent increase in the food and live animals category, largely reflects increases in cereals and preparations; animal feed stuffs; meat and meat preparations and miscellaneous edible products. On the other hand, the importation of live animals except fish and dairy products and eggs fell 29.6 percent and 23.8 percent respectively (see Table 2.5).

Available data on beverages and tobacco imports indicate that there was a marginal increase of 0.4 percent with tobacco products increasing substantially by 60.0 percent to a value of CI $\$ 4.1$ million, as compared to CI\$2.6 million in 2010.

The importation of mineral fuels, lubricants and related materials which account for the highest share of imports, increased by 43.2 percent moving from $\$ 128.0$ million in 2010 to CI $\$ 183.4$ million in 2011. This can be largely attributed to an increase in both the price and quantity of fuel products. It must be noted that prices have increased at a faster pace than quantity.

In the chemical and related products category, increases were recorded in essential oil, perfume and toiletry products ( $6.3 \%$ ) and in dyeing, tanning and colouring materials (15.4\%), while medicinal and pharmaceutical products and manufactured fertilizers declined by 13.9 percent and 20.1 percent respectively.

Manufactured goods classified chiefly by materials, showed a decline of 1.8 percent. Accounting for this downturn was a 24.1 percent drop in manufactures of metals not elsewhere specified and a 45.6 percent drop in textile yarn, fabrics, made-up articles and related products. However, paper and paper products and iron and steel products recorded an increase of 21.4 percent and 37.5 percent respectively.

The overall 9.7 percent increase in the machinery and transport equipment category was largely fuelled by increases in the sub-categories of power generating machinery and equipment ( $51.3 \%$ ); telecommunications, sound recording and reproducing apparatus and equipment ( $70.8 \%$ ); and aircraft, boats, ships and associated equipment ( $35.8 \%$ ). However, electrical machinery and apparatus declined 13.2 percent.

By country of origin, import shares of the United States (90.9\%), Germany (1.0\%), Jamaica $(0.7 \%)$ and Korea $(0.6 \%)$ increased in 2011 compared to their shares in 2010.

An analysis of imports by broad economic classification (BEC) reveals that all sections grew with the exception of industrial supplies not elsewhere specified (see Table 2.7). Fuel and lubricants increased by 44.0 percent while industrial supplies not elsewhere specified fell by 1.4 per cent. Capital goods (except transportation equipment) also registered a growth of 11.0 percent.

### 3.3 Exports

In 2011, total exports, which comprise largely of re-exports, increased significantly by 63.6 percent to $\$ 18.1$ million compared to the 30.8 percent decrease recorded in 2010 (see Table 3.1). All export categories showed an increase with the exception of food and live animals and manufactured goods classified chiefly by materials.

For the same period, commodities and transactions not elsewhere classified which are mostly re-exports (such as personal effects) continued to dominate as these contributed 70.1 percent of the total exports, while crude materials contributed 11.5 percent.
